
If you educate a man, you educate an individual. But if you educate a woman, you educate a family. When girls are educated, their countries become stronger and more prosperous.



LAKSHMI BUILDS UP A GOAT EINTERPRISE!


I'm a single woman, taking care of my old mother and tending to my goats all by myself.I come from the Daund village of Maharashtra. When my husband abandoned me a few years ago, I felt quite helpless and my world shattered into pieces. I owned 4 goats but I had no understanding or proper training on rearing them, feeding them or even creating the right environment for them until I joined the Digital Sakhi programme.

Digital Sakhi Programme has helped hundreds of women like me by training them in animal rearing, applying for business loans and providing with information and help for availing government schemes. This programme gave me the confidence to learn the ropes of banking and handling digital payments as well. Today I'm a proud owner of 30 goats and hope to have 100 more, while setting an example of perseverance and resilience for others in my village.

Often, people think that women should only look after their families and children, and that they cannot do anything on their own. I'm happy I stood up for myself-against everyone who discouraged me—and proved that women are as capable than men.

It was a tough journey with several ups and downs, but the Digital Sakhi programme recognised my entrepreneurial skills and helped me stay strong. The shift from traditional household chores to learning digital transactions was the toughest part. But I enjoyed this challenge and I'm happy that such programmes are available for the betterment and empowerment of women. This programme has changed my thought process and made me mature and knowledgeable. I am ready to take on any challenge in the future.

Until two years ago, I was just a housewife with one household cow. I always wanted to contribute to my family's income and give them all the happiness in the world, but didn't know how to until I enrolled for the Digital Sakhi programme. My family was sceptical about me joining the programme. They were of the opinion that an independent woman would interfere in family matters and rebel against the elders. It was a huge task to convince them that I could build my own identity as an independent woman. I went ahead and got myself enrolled. I did not have enough education, yet I learnt everything in no time. It was a tough journey but it did pay off.

The programme mentors taught me about procuring the best quality of ingredients for fodder, how to use cow dung for manure through composting, and also vaccinations to be given to the cattle. Today I'm a proud woman entrepreneur with a dairy supply business and a permanent shelter for the cows. Some day, I hope to have my own dairy. From my savings I was able to set up a restaurant for my son. I have been able to set an example for everyone in my village that women are capable of doing anything they dream! One thing I noticed was that people were apprehensive about using digital modes of payment even when they needed to withdraw or transfer funds urgently. Once a fellow villager wanted to send money to his son in the city, but could not do it because it was a weekend. That's when I took it upon myself to change this self-limiting mindset of people and work for the benefit of these villagers so that they could use electronic methods of payment. However, I was quite an amateur in this area until my skills were honed properly through the Digital Sakhi programme.

My ability to convince people and solve their problems was recognised and appreciated by the on-ground implementation partners of the programme. Being a part of this programme gave me the opportunity to be a Cluster Manager for Solapur district. I want women in my village to be self-dependent, be capable of conducting digital transactions and have financial freedom. I also want to be more and more involved in the cause of gender equality and development, and my dream is to become the sarpanch of my village.

That way I can equip my village with not only day-to-day support, but also introduce digital financial inclusion practices. I strongly believe that women are as capable as men.

I was always dependent on my husband and used to hand over my finances to him. After he was gone, I was at a loss. Shortly after that, another blow struck me when my son was not allowed to sit for his final exams because we couldn't pay his school fees. His entire year was wasted.

While looking at alternatives to bring myself out of this predicament, I came to know about the Digital Sakhi programme from my friend and decided to visit their camp.

I learnt about digital transactions and how to use a smartphone to do banking transactions all by myself. This programme brought stability in my life and now I'm much more independent than I ever was. My in-laws supported me, and so did other women in the village. I feel a sense of pride on having accomplished it myself!

The honorarium that I get as Digital Sakhi has motivated me further to achieve my target of training the rural community on Digital Finance. I now have the confidence to fund my son's engineering course he wishes to enrol in the future. The women in my village are trained enough to fearlessly speak up and put forth their views without hesitation. Nothing can stop me now.

When I heard about Digital Sakhi, I was initially very hesitant to join it. But I did, and now I can say confidently that it completely changed my world! Thanks to the leadership and communication training provided by industry experts, I gained self-confidence and I can now talk to the villagers without hesitation. I have helped to bring about a new wave of change in my village by passing on my knowledge and creating awareness regarding various government schemes and digital modes of payments. I was never known to anyone in the village, but this programme created a new identity for me. Nowadays, I'm so busy that I don't even realise how my days pass by. My family is proud of me and helps me manage the household work.

I have helped some women avail benefits of of up to Rs 2 lakhs which have been deposited in their account through Atal Pension Yojna, assisted a farmer in appointing a counsellor to avail the benefits of the Gopinath Munde Apghat Bima Yojana, and helped some students in accessing training under the Deen Dayal Upadhyaya Grameen Kaushalya Yojana. I have gained self-respect and the freedom to work.

I was also afraid for the mental state of my children as they were witness to my plight everyday, and were scared of their own father. My parents refused to help me out, saying it was not their place to interfere, and such violence is common in every house. How wrong their words turned out to be!

The Digital Sakhi programme brought me hope and opened the doors to a new world, where there was no abuse, only respect. My work involved working with many villagers and spreading awareness about various government schemes. People started looking up to me and respecting me. Looking at this, my husband too turned a new leaf and quit alcohol! He actually started encouraging me and respecting my work and contribution to society. His joy knew no bounds when I gifted him a smartphone worth Rs 5,000 from my own savings! My family life has become so much better and happier. I have earned the respect of not only the neighbours, but also my in-laws and the whole community. I am able to earn enough to supplement my family income, buy gifts for my children, and also pay my younger brother's school fees.

Now, I operate my own bank account and have enrolled for the food coupon scheme. Digital Sakhi has not only helped me gain income, but also self-respect and a happy family life.

With the money that I earn now, I am able to buy my children's books and gifts and also invest in a better way for my children's future. A WOMAN WHO BECAME A TECH SAKHI



Staying in a conservative joint family of 10 in Barwani district of Madhya Pradesh, I was ridiculed by my mother-in-law for wanting to go out and even for looking out of the door at the crowd. I was not considered a part of the family when it came to decision-making. I always wished to go out and do something more productive. But the restrictions in my orthodox house were stifling my desires to explore new opportunities.

Though Barwani is a good-sized town, the only accessibility is via road. Perhaps that is why, waves of change come very late here, and the people in my village are still used to their traditional ways of life. Just like its name "Barwani", which means "a garden of banyans", these beliefs are deep-rooted in the society.

I joined Digital Sakhi, which gave me the right opportunity to prove my abilities. I received training in digital finance and I now encourage people in my village to transact electronically. I helped them open bank accounts, and informed them about various insurance schemes. Empowering women and encouraging them to save money by opening their own bank accounts is my passion. I believe that financial independence is important to grow individually. Slowly, the mindset of people is changing, and they are opening up to new ways of living.

Through this programme, I was able to change the mindset of my family members and they have a new found respect for me. I also taught my husband how to use Google Pay and Bhim applications. In turn, he helps me with household chores, and even cooking. And all women in the household now live peacefully!

BAND OF SISTERS BRING WATER RELIEF

I belong to the Ojhar Village in Barwani district of Madhya Pradesh. The maximum temperature of Barwani in April and May can go as high as 48°C, making it one of the hottest places in Central India.

I am one of the women from "The Band of Sisters"— a part of the Digital Sakhis. Since there are no pipelines in our village, all women have to walk long distances to fetch drinking water for our household chores. Often, they faint carrying the heavy water pots in the summer heat, or fall sick due to heat strokes or tiring walks.

The women in our village share a very close bond of sisterhood and we realised that water shortage is a grave problem that needs to be resolved. It was affecting the entire village, especially women. A few of us decided to first create awareness about the issues amongst the rest of the women in the village. We urged everyone to attend the Gram Panchayat meeting so that together, we could make a strong appeal to the Sarpanch.

When that appeal did not show results, we registered a complaint on the Chief Minister's Helpline and soon received a response. The officials visited the village to verify the situation and on their recommendation, the Sarpanch organised for water tanks to reach homes on alternate days. He also requested for the complaint to be withdrawn! But we "Sakhis" refused and have demanded for a tap and a water connection to each and every house in the village.

How strange it is, that we have to fight for the most basic necessity of life - water! Today, pipelines are being laid and the water woes of the Ojhar will soon be a thing of the past.

Since I started doing this work, it has become the biggest achievement of my life! I help people use online platforms to pay their bills, book tickets and transfer money on the go. They cannot believe how easy and simple it is to use a digital method of payment.

Today, I have emerged a new person with knowledge about current technologies and who can undertake initiatives with the community. I'm proud of myself, and my journey as a Digital Sakhi has just begun!
